2023 PET OWNER ATTITUDE SURVEY: KEY FINDINGS

November 2023



Methodology

- TRUE Global Intelligence fielded an online survey of 1,000 U.S. pet owners from September 8 to 14, 2023. The survey had an average completion time of 11 minutes.
- To qualify for the survey, respondents had to:
 - Live in the U.S.
 - Be between 18 and 99 years old
 - Own at least one cat or one dog
- Quotas were used to ensure the data are representative of U.S. adult pet owners.





Summary of Findings



Pet owners prefer and recognize the importance of an inperson relationship with their veterinarian

Agree that they prefer to meet a veterinarian inperson before allowing them to care for their pet(s)



Agree that having the veterinarian physically examine their pet and talk to them in person is what leads to the best care



Pet owners have a strong preference for veterinarian-led care as opposed to delegating responsibility for care decisions to non-veterinarians, including a proposed mid-level employee



Agree it would be dangerous for anyone other than a licensed veterinarian to make recommendations about life-or-death decisions for their pet




8 in 10 (79%) agree they want a licensed veterinarian, not a veterinary technician or midlevel employee, to be in charge of their pet's care





Pet owners feel strongly about in-person relationships with veterinarians because they prioritize their pet's health and safety above all else when seeking veterinary care

Most pet owners have high expectations of the medical professional overseeing their pet's health and safety






Pet owners have not experienced long wait times to see a veterinarian

For Routine Care or an Injury

Residents in rural areas and cat owners are not as receptive to telemedicine; middle-income pet owners have the highest positive opinion of telemedicine



Urban pet owners have more experience with— and are more open to— telemedicine than pet owners who live in suburban or rural areas.



Positivity towards, trust in, and consideration of telemedicine is lowest among cat only owners. Cat only owners are more likely to prefer in-person treatment and are less likely to have used telemedicine.




Though both middle income and higher income pet owners have high expectations for veterinarians, it's the higher income owners who most believe in-person examinations deliver higher quality of care than telemedicine. Middle-income pet owners are the most positive towards telemedicine; lower-income and higher-income are nearly tied in terms of their perceptions.



Veterinary Care Preferences and Experiences





Most pet owners regularly take their pets to routine checkups; two-thirds have taken their pet to a checkup in the last 6 months





Nearly half who have taken their pet in for a medical emergency waited less than an hour; more than half took their pet to their regular veterinarian





Q: Thinking of the last time your pet had an immediate medical emergency, where did you take your pet to get help?




Q: Thinking of the last time your pet had an immediate medical emergency, how long did you have to wait before your pet received help?

Veterinary Care Preferences






Almost half of pet owners say their pet's health and safety is their number one priority when seeking veterinary care; telemedicine availability is a low priority
